He's kept them in the engraved ("Capt. L.M. Titus 5th Reg't. NH Vol's.") silver glasses case he also bought from Historic Eyewear, until now. On October 26, he obtained the prescription lenses at the nearby Sussex Vogue

Optical, so, now, he'll be better at seeing "what's happening to my boys!" (to quote General Pickett, or, at least, Stephen Lang) at upcoming events.

Flag Improvements Planned for This Winter

During a campfire discussion at Kings Landing on Friday night, September 22, Lindsay Titus discussed the possibility of spending some Co. H money on improvements to the flags we use at most events, including both encampments and indoor displays. This spending received approval from both Leigh and Loran Gavel, although no dollar amount was discussed. Information sharing with Co. H members will occur prior to any major expenditure on flags, staffs, finials or accessories. Currently, we have a 2nd Corps pennant (made by Dave Adams' wife, Lily) that is attached to a large diameter wooden dowel, and a National flag that is undersized, and has, as a finial, a period-correct eagle, except that it is plastic.

Flags, continued...

The flag, the finial and the dowel were all intended to be temporary measures to add colour to a camp or display, but they have now been used at many of our events over several years.

The hope is to replace the dowel with a period-correct flag staff and add a brass army spear-point finial to its top, along with a brass finial for the National flag staff. It is still to be determined if the National flag finial will be an eagle or a spear, but recent research into photographs of New Hampshire flags seems to reveal the widespread use of the army spear finial. Also requiring investigation will be the purchase of larger-diameter flagstaffs, needed to carry the weight of future full-size national and regimental colours. This may necessitate the purchase of more robust in-ground flag holders, with openings wide enough to accommodate the larger-diameter staffs.

Flags played a key role in Civil War armies. They were symbols of pride and morale among the soldiers, but they also guided regiments on the battlefield when noise, smoke and the confusion of battle prevented orders from being otherwise communicated. They also helped identify units from afar amid the smoke and confusion of battle. Many times over the years, we have had comments and questions from the public about the nature of our flags; they have become excellent teaching opportunities, and remain a source of unit pride.

A Response to the Mass-shooting in Maine

In response to the mass-shooting that occurred in late October in, and around, Lewiston, Maine, Captain Titus emailed Matt Bray, commanding officer of Co. A, Third Maine; and Paul Dudley, president of Co. B, Twentieth Maine, offering the support of the membership of Co. H, Fifth New Hampshire.

The email, sent on October 26, read, "Gentlemen: I wanted you both to know that our thoughts and prayers are with you, your respective companies, your families and, indeed, the people of Maine as you navigate through this tragedy that overtook your great state last night."

"Nova Scotia suffered its own mass-shooting a couple of years ago, so we, in this part of Canada, understand what impact such an occurrence has on families, communities and the entire state."

"Be safe, and know that your friends here in Atlantic Canada are thinking of you all." (*signed*) Lindsay Titus, Capt., Co. H, 5th Reg't. New Hampshire Vol's.

On Friday, October 27, Paul Dudley responded, "Thank you," and on October 30, Matt Bray replied, "Thanks, Lindsay. Fortunately, no direct impact on our membership, but an indirect impact on all of us. Be well, my friend. (*signed*) Matt.

Should Co. H Members Invest in Hardee Hats?

Upon seeing the Hardee hat that Dave Bottos brought in for display at the Atlantic Outdoor Sports Show in Halifax last March, some quick discussion brought about an informal decision that we should all get Hardee hats. This is not a company requirement, but seeing Dave's hat reminded us all that the Hardee hat is a fine-looking, and often-overlooked, part of the dress Civil War uniform.

Officially known as the Model 1858 Dress Hat, the Hardee hat gained its popular name after its creator, Lieutenant Colonel William J. Hardee, Superintendent of Cadets at West Point from 1856-1860. Hardee resigned his commission in 1861 to join the Confederate army, where he rose to the rank of lieutenant general, and corps command.

Although most soldiers, especially in the east, adopted the forage cap as the favoured headwear, soldiers from the west are often seen in period photographs wearing either Hardee or slouch hats. Most famously, men of the Iron Brigade from Wisconsin, Michigan and Indiana were often referred to as the "Black Hats" for their choice of headwear while on the march.



Today, Hardee hats are available from a variety of sutlers, although some sutlers that have carried them in the past, now appear to be out of stock. Of course, price and quality vary, but they are often available either as a plain hat or fully furnished with brass eagle keeper, infantry horn, company letter, infantry (sky blue) hat cord and ostrich plumes.

Through research of text and photographs by Dave Bottos, the fold of the brim for infantry enlisted men is made on the left side of the Hardee hat (*as shown on page 3*) (officers on the right). For dress occasions, such as graveside services, the Hardee hat is an excellent addition to our uniforms. Add white gloves to your kit (also available at many sutlers) and a frock coat, and you have before you a fine-looking soldier.

1st Sgt. Gavel Makes Donation

First Sergeant Leigh Gavel announced in a Facebook posting on November 12 that he has made an engraved leather-bound notebook that will be donated for use as a door prize by the Atlantic Outdoor Sports & RV Show, to be held on March 8-10, in Halifax.

- Leonard's Mills Encampment Cancelled In a year of event postponements and cancellations, Co. B, 20th Maine suffered the cancellation of a favourite annual event, the encampment at Leonard's Mills, located just north of Eddington, Maine. Once again the cause of the cancellation was weather, as post-tropical storm Philippe chose the weekend of October 7-8 to find its way to the coasts of Maine and New Brunswick. We know of at least one Co. I member (Dave Menton) who had been planning to participate in this event. Philippe joins Lee and other "extreme weather events" (those things we used to call "storms") that disrupted event schedules.
- **Regimental History Available** Dr. William Child was a regimental surgeon in the 5th New Hampshire, and was also a historian of the regiment. In 1893, he published <u>A History of the Fifth Regiment New Hampshire Volunteers in the American Civil War, 1861-1865</u>; now an excellent primary source for research of the regiment. It is available in print as a reprint from Amazon as a hardcover book (\$72.90 Cdn.) or as a paperback (\$29.24 Cdn.), but it is also available on-line at no cost by visiting the websites of either the University of New Hampshire at *scholars.unh.edu*, or the Antietam Institute at *antietaminstitute.org*.
